### A few words from Fr Joe....

43 years ago, before my ordination, I assisted at the wedding of my friends Christopher and Rowena, in our local Catholic church in Newcastle, Co Down. The then young couple had met at university in England, Christopher was Anglican, Rowena, my neighbour and childhood friend, Catholic, and at that time inter church marriages were still very rare, at least where we lived. I don't remember all the details of the rather complicated rules and regulations that had to be followed, but they often referred back to the experience of 'jumping through hoops' to get married in the way they wanted.

We begin the week of prayer for Christian Unity 2025 on January 18<sup>th</sup> and it runs through to the 25<sup>th</sup>. The material to guide this reflective week is available on the internet and has been prepared by the monks of the ecumenical monastery of Bose in Northern Italy. It begins by posing the question that Jesus put to Martha, "Do you believe this?" (John 11:26). These words are spoken to a friend, in love, and yet carry a challenge that we all face, what do we believe? When the creed is recited Sunday by Sunday we speak of our common belief in one voice, we experience and affirm our tradition which has been handed down through the centuries since creedal formulas were first worked thought at various Councils of the fledgling church. This year it is the creed of the Council of Nicaea, from 1700 years ago, that is being marked. Then, perhaps as now, there was confusion, division and factions within the church. The creed was a sincere effort to bring forms of expression of a common faith into the life and prayer of all Christians.

In the notes accompanying the material offered this one line really jumped out at me: "Our polarised and fracturing world is in need of a new vision for peace, centred on the recognition of our interconnectedness and shared humanity." It seems that faith will flourish where churches, leaders and members walk together in humility and hope.

On Wednesday last, I was in St Peter's Anglican church in Hanwell, near Banbury to lead the funeral service for Christopher. I stood on one side of the coffin and local Anglican priest stood on the other side. Our prayers and participation dovetailed beautifully, a seamless expression of our common belief in resurrection and a profound expression of the same understanding of the hope which Jesus brought into the world. There was little or no sense of them and us, it just felt so good that we did it together. Christopher and Rowena lived a happy married life, carrying their two traditions and nationalities in a common pursuit of love, you might say they lived out 'Christian Unity.'
